
### Can you share a story?

### Flying the flag for Hardingstone



It has been many a long year since a flag last flew from the top of the church tower. The flag of St George can clearly be seen fluttering in pictures from 25 years ago, but could this proud image be repeated for the next generation?

A new flag was purchased through the generosity of Christine Wilkes - a cross of St George with the Peterborough Diocese coat of arms in the first quadrant. The Supporters of St Edmunds took up the rest of the challenge. The Supporters are dedicated to preserving Hardingstone's church, and after a year of successful fundraising we have raised almost £4,000 for maintenance and improvement projects.

With our finances in place, local contractor Richard Milne was appointed to install new ladders and safety features, to tame the hazardous access to the tower. At last the flag could be raised – *what a great first project for the charity!* 

The day was set for April 22nd, a gloriously hot and sunny Easter bank holiday Monday. It was a true community celebration. Hardingstone scout group were invited, as St George is their patron saint, and Bouverie WI provided refreshments to raise funds for their centenary banner's display case.

The flag was brought to the tower door by a Scouts colour party and guard of honour. Churchwarden John Wilson thanked all concerned, and the new flag was hoisted by Luke Dillow. Very movingly, each scout section remade their promises and we all enjoyed the refreshments.

### Site works begin for new development

Site works have begun for the housing development on the field behind The Warren and Newport Pagnell Road. The site is owned by Homes England, and Kier Living will deliver most of the development. A detailed planning application has been submitted to finalise the appearance including house styles and boundary treatments, landscaping, layout and scale.

This development will eventually provide 1,000 new dwellings, and facilities including a primary school, community centre, sports field, local shops, pub, allotments and play areas.

The public footpath which currently runs from Heritage Farm Close to the Newport Pagnell Road will be retained, but it will be developed to include a cycleway as well as pedestrian footpath.

The main road access will be from the Landimore Road, and there will be an additional entry and left -turn-only exit route onto the Newport Pagnell Road. There will be no vehicular access from The Warren except for emergency vehicles.

The development will also make a financial contribution to changes on the surrounding roads to help them cope with the increase in traffic. This will include the Newport Pagnell Road, Queen Eleanor roundabout and the Brackmills Industrial Estate.

#### Phasing

The development is expected to take many years to complete: the first phase will deliver only residential units and primary routes through the site. These will be in the areas closest to Landimore Road (both sides), roughly level with Pagnell Close (the recently redeveloped garage) in the west to Pagnell Court (the old fever hospital) in the east.

The proposed mix of housing and parking for this first phase is shown in the table. 37 of the units will be accessible and adaptable, and 8 will be fully

wheelchair accessible.

In addition to the allocated parking there will be a further 228 unallocated parking spaces available for visitors.

#### Where to go for more information

The application is currently being considered by Northampton Borough Council, and more details can be found on their website: planning. northamptonboroughcouncil.com, application number N/2019/0048. Residents can submit comments in writing or through the website.

### Queen Eleanor roundabout changes Northamptonshire County Council announced on 3<sup>rd</sup> May that it will shortly be discussing works to upgrade junctions along the A45. The financial contribution from the Hardingstone housing development means that Queen Eleanor (QE) Interchange should be a high priority.

The Parish Council (HPC) is concerned that widening the QE roundabout to five lanes will have an adverse effect on Hardingstone traffic, as the upgrade does not include traffic signals for Hardingstone Lane. HPC has put mitigating proposals forward, and is awaiting a response.



# Parish council meeting 2<sup>nd</sup> April 2019

As part of his report the Neighbourhood Warden advised that the bike ramps that had been dug out in Cherry Orchard Woods had been flattened. There had been some complaints from users. Any further complaints are to be passed to NBC. Those complaining have been advised that if they petition NBC will look to see if there is a safe place for a facility to be installed.

Planning application N/2019/0307 for works on property in Newport Pagnell Road were considered. A neighbour had objected and it was agreed the Parish Council would support the Neighbour's complaints.

Guidelines for the setting up and workings of the newsletter were agreed.

The Police had contacted Parish Councils regarding dedicated PCSO's. The Parish Council felt that past experience showed that this was not good use of

parish funds and decided against this scheme.

Councillors had met with Highways about the potential for putting bollards outside the village hall to prevent people parking on the pavement over the double yellow lines. Whilst in principle this is possible, funding at NCC means it may not be a priority.

Football clubs had approached the parish council to see if they could used the Recreation ground for matches or practice. Terms of Reference for any group wishing to do this were tabled and approved.

More changes to the contract for handing over Cherry Orchard had been put forward. The Parish Council are getting frustrated at the constant changes and considered pulling out all together. Clerk to contact Borough Cllr Nunn to see if he can help.

## Parish Council meeting 7<sup>th</sup> May 2019

Councillor Perry Thomas was re-elected as Chair for the coming year, with Councillor Jim Kerr being re-elected as Vice Chair.

County Councillor Lizzy Bowen gave an update on finances at NCC. In the last year the council had a £0.1m underspend compared to £64m overspend in the previous year. The commissioners have recommended that the S114, which limited spend, be removed, but similar robustness in spend decisions should be used. Priorities for NCC in the coming year are Adult Social Care, Children's homes and Roads and Infrastructure.

The parish council considered audit paperwork, approving the governance statement and the Fi-

nancial statement. Policies and procedures of the council were considered and readopted, some with minor changes. It was agreed to renew insurance with current insurance provider.

Grant applications from local groups were considered and approved. Each will be contacted separately.

The parish council agreed to have a stall at Hardingstone Academy summer fun day.

Terms of reference for the parish room users were readopted and should be sent out to regular users as a refresher.

3 Hardingstone residents and a family member from Scotland are taking part in the 'THE RUST BUCKET CHALLENGE 2019'. Chris Mulcahy, Bruce Wright, Dave Adams and his brother Neil will be driving 2,500 miles, through 9 countries, in a car they purchased for £350, over 4 days.

The starting point is Wellingborough, and the journey takes them through France, Monaco, Italy, Switzerland, Lichtenstein, Germany, Netherlands and Belgium.



The aim is to raise much needed funds for 'Children are Butterflies', a Northampton based charity that offers practical and financial support when arranging a funeral that was probably not expected and not planned for. More importantly, emotional support is offered through an established network of parents and families who have suffered similar losses.

The challenge will take place 7th-10th June, and they are 1 of 50 cars taking part.

### The Archbishop visits Hardingstone

As part of his visit to Northampton on 9th April, Lambeth Palace had asked that Archbishop Justin could see some children's work. Due to it being the Easter holidays, Canon Beverley arranged to restage the 'Experience Young Jesus' event, recently held for Hardingstone Academy and Hackleton school, and the children who had previously attended were invited to return.

Some 25 children returned to St Edmunds and

shared their thoughts with the important visitors about the experiences of a Jewish child 2,000 years ago, living under Roman rule, fleeing as a refugee to Egypt, respecting and learning from his elders but also challenging them. Emotions were shared, and myths replaced with known practices and archaeological evidence (Jesus was not born in a stable).

The children then had a Q&A with Archbishop Justin, who fielded such questions as:

### Do you live in Canterbury?

I spend 70-80 days in Canterbury each year, about 130 days in London, and the rest of the time I am travelling.

#### Where is your favourite place and why?

Apart from home.... it's difficult because there are different types of favourite. One is where I feel the job is going well, like a place in Eastern Congo, called Goma. I love the Bishop there and he's doing very difficult work. There are 3 wars going on in his diocese and Ebola, but he organises football tournaments for the soldiers from the different sides and teaches them about Jesus and Peace. And he teaches the women and girls how to make a living. My other favourite place is North Norfolk, where I grew up.

### Who's the most famous person you've ever married?

Apart from my wife, you're probably thinking of Harry and Megan last year. That was extraordinary. There was a rehearsal the night before at Windsor castle at 6.15, which is quite a way from



London. I was with Harry and Megan, and it was getting quite late, and I was worried we wouldn't get there in time. But Harry said 'don't worry we'll go in convoy' and off we went with police outriders, the blues and twos. It was great fun. They are really special, lovely people, and we're very lucky to have them in the Royal family.

We were all very impressed with the sincerity and humour with which Justin spoke to the children. After 45 minutes with us he was whisked away to the next event in his busy schedule, but was overheard remarking how well behaved the children of Hardingstone had been!

### Arts Festival season welcomes local community

The Northampton High Arts Festival has been a highlight for the school community for a number of years. Last year, the year in which the School reached its 140<sup>th</sup> Birthday, the Arts Festival took on new life when it was extended to an Arts Festival Week, celebrating the Creative Arts and Performing Arts from across the School, from Nursery to Sixth Form.

Following the resounding success of this weeklong event, with record numbers of visitors attending, Northampton High is delighted to be hosting an Arts Festival Season, which will kick off with performances of the Senior production of CATS the Musical starting on 12 June and will culminate with an Arts Invitational event on Thursday 27 June.

The Arts Festival season is an ideal time to invite guests into School to experience a wide range of events – from literary talks to languages, from piano recitals to poetry. The season will involve children from local primary schools, who will be welcomed into school to join in the Festival. Events for local schools will include a daytime performance of CATS the Musical; author event with Ross Welford, superb storyteller and author of The Dog Who Saved The World and Time Travelling With a Hamster, and Pippa Goodhart, highlyregarded and prize-winning children's writer and author of Raven Boy and the Winnie The Witch series (under the name Laura Owen).

### Hardingstone Scout Group

1st Hardingstone Scout Group is the largest Youth organisation in Hardingstone, the biggest Scout Group in Northampton District and the second largest Group in Northamptonshire. It boasts a Beaver colony for 6 to 8-year olds that meets on Thursdays 6pm - 7:15pm, a Cub Pack for 8 - 10 year olds that meets Mondays 6:30pm - 8pm and two Scout Troops for 10 – 14-year olds, Saxons Tuesday 7:30pm - 9pm and Vikings Thursday 7:30pm - 9pm. We are also very pleased to announce that we are opening an Explorer Unit for 14 - 18-year olds on Wednesday 7:30pm - 9pm. The Explorers work towards their D of E awards and ultimately the Queen Scout Award. They set and execute their own program week to week.

In total we currently have 110 young members enjoying Scouting through a varied programme designed to offer young people Skills For Life.

We have plans to open a second Cub pack and Beaver Colony, but to do this will take volunteers which are often hard to come by. We have had some success though having recently recruited 4 Adults through adverts in the Forum for the Four-week challenge. 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
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
