Notes from recent Parish Council meetings

There has been lots of talk about the proposed bike park on the old Hardingstone 9 golf course. The Council is not opposed to the idea, but a number of residents have raised issues regarding the application. The council has met with our West Northants Councillors to discuss these concerns, to see if some of these can be mitigated against as part of the planning approval. Our priority is to ensure the safety of our residents. See report on page 5.

We have made lots of updates around the village. In the Rec there is new matting under the rest of the play equipment. At the War memorial we have tidied up the area and added more planters which have been planted for the winter and spring by councillors and ex councillors. We are now looking to making the area look Christmassy.



Whilst many of you expressed that you were in favour of us paying for a dedicated PCSO this is not something we can justify doing on our own, and we would need to partner with another parish nearby. At this moment in time there is not the appetite to do this in the other councils.



Northampton Bike Park

A formal planning application has now been submitted to West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) for a mountain bike park to be laid out on the former 9 hole golf course at the back of High Street, Back Lane, Ilex close and Houghton Hill. To view the documents relating to the application, select

'Planning' on the Parish Council website (see page 4), and click on the WNC Planning Database link marked 'List of applications'. Enter the application number WNN/2021/0797 into the search box.



Proposed Bike Park on former Delapre 9 golf course

Councillors from Hardingstone Parish Council (HPC) highlighted their concerns about this development to our three WNC councillors at a meeting held to discuss the plans for the Mountain Bike Park.

The Parish Council has no objections in principle to the scheme, but expressed some serious concerns about the way it would operate and the effect it might have on Hardingstone residents.

WNC assured us that from now on the track will be called 'Northampton Bike Park' with no mention of Hardingstone.

It was promised that parking and facilities for cyclists would be provided at Delapre Golf Complex, but it was pointed out that the proposed parking charges would encourage drivers to seek alternative parking places. The Parish Council insists that suitable signage, gates and bollards be put in place to prevent parking in the village, and it was suggested that 'No access to bike park' notices at the entrances to the village would provide an additional deterrent.

HPC have serious concerns about the dangers where the bike track crosses two public rights of way. Some method of allowing safe access for pedestrians must be put in place.

There seemed to be little information in the planning application concerning management and marshalling of the track. What steps will be taken to prevent motor cycles from using the track, and to prevent anti-social use in the area by cyclists and others?

Many are concerned about the flora and fauna of the site, but HPC were assured that a full ecological survey and ongoing monitoring will take place.

The Parish Council is closely following developments and will continue to hold meetings with WNC to try to mitigate the potential impact on the village. WNC said that they would provide a response to these concerns within a few weeks. The application will be submitted to the WNC Planning Committee for approval in due course, and at this point members of the public will have the opportunity to voice their concerns directly to the decision makers.

Hardingstone Neighbourhood Watch



Northampton Neighbourhood Policing Team has announced the three top issues of focus: Road safety, anti-social behaviour and drug dealing or misuse.

At County level there are four priorities: serious and organised crime, domestic abuse, knife crime and antisocial behaviour.

Recently there were two break-ins to vehicles by smashing windows. Leave <u>nothing</u> on display in the cab.

PCSO Shelton says: "PCSO Evans and I attended The Well coffee morning at St Edmund's on Friday 19th November to speak to residents about personal safety and to discuss any issues they had. It was a very valuable event and fantastic to speak to such lovely people." The next one is 19^{th} January 10.30-11.30. It's your chance to hear and share valuable information. There's coffee and cake too!

Please check your front hedges for overhanging branches. At eye-level these are dangerous for our residents with poor sight, those who need to watch the ground for trip hazards and those in wheelchairs or mobility scooters.

St Dorothea or Dorothy?

Our article on contrasting ladies in the October/
November HP Source referred to St Dorothea, virgin
and martyr, as depicted in one of the windows in the
south aisle of St Edmund's church. The stained glass in
this window was painted by Ernest (EW) Twining, a
local artist, whose works can be seen in a number of
local churches. Sue Ward, who works in the
Northampton Museum and Art Gallery, has some
interesting information about this window, as she
explained to Bill Lockerbie who has been giving guided
tours round the church and researching aspects of its
history at the museum.





"I mentioned to you about EW Twining and the connection with my grandmother. The image on the left is from the stained glass window in Hardingstone Church: the window this is taken from has two images, St Edmund and St Dorothea. I visited the church during a heritage weekend, and I noted that the information about the church stated that there was no known connection between St Dorothea and the church. I am quite certain that this is one of the stained glass windows that my grandmother sat for.

My grandmother was Dorothy Roberta Bottrill. She was born 26/09/1900, and the story I was told by my mother was that before she got married, in the 1920s, she worked in a Tobacconists in the Drapery. Ernest

Twining was one of the regular customers, and he took a shine to Dorothy, asking her to sit for him which she did on a number of occasions. It is believed that he used her image in a number of his stained glass windows in a few local churches, although I only know of the one in Hardingstone. I want to see if I can find any more.

The image on the right of St Dorothea is the painting we have in the family, which we know was painted by Twining and is signed by him. We believe it was painted before she got married, and was given to her as a wedding present when my grandparents got married in 1930. I think there is a good resemblance between the two images. My grandmother was older than my grandfather and kept her age a secret, though we believe she was 30 when she got married. There is a suspicion that there could have been a romantic connection with Twining, but he would have been much older than my Grandma and it is only speculation! I do wonder if he called St Dorothea after my grandmother but again that's more speculation.

I found this final image on the internet a few years ago, where it was stated that this was painted in 1935 and is in the Northampton Museum. I do believe that there is also a resemblance between this and my grandmother, although it would appear that it was painted after my grandmother got married. I would be really pleased if any of your readers can provide further information."








Cut-a-Caper Band invitation in December and January

From a steady beginning, we now need to step up a gear and start some serious fundraising to 'restore, preserve and improve' the Hardingstone church building. Public donations and volunteers are needed. We'd love you to consider this in your New Year resolutions, and budget.



Since its inception almost 4 years ago, the charity's finances can be summarised as follows:

The grants to the church council (PCC) have paid for new ladders up to the top of the tower, a replacement carpet on the dais, a sum towards the projector and screen, for the café tables, new outdoor speaker, and the fees for the reordering feasibility study.

These improvements have made a very big difference to the church and community, and we are very appreciative of <u>all</u> this support, with special thanks to the Friends of Hardingstone.

The feasibility study encouraged the PCC to 'dream dreams' and consider how to make the best use of the space for maximum usage by the whole community. If all our dreams for St Edmund's could be realised — a fully accessible level floor throughout the building, efficient heating, better toilets and servery, raising the mezzanine

floor (so the bells can be rung properly again), new seats and storage - the estimated costs amount to up to £750k.

Injecting a note of realism, reordering will have to be delivered in stages and a more manageable recent quote for just heating the church with 16 radiators is £34k. We need significant public donations in order to progress these works. There's more research to be done and permissions to be obtained before any decisions are taken, but we do need to start saving up meanwhile.

We will be able to share the ideas and plans from the feasibility study with the whole community very soon to whet your appetite! Please contact me for further information about contributing to the Supporters of St Edmund's. Thank you.

Tony Penn

Tony has been a familiar face in the village for years. His wide horticultural knowledge has been appreciated by many.

He was born a twin in 1939, into a farming family at Wootton Hill Farm, whose land now forms East Hunsbury and part of the Crematorium. Wootton Hill

Farm and Penn Gardens are two roads in the area whose names reflect the local history.

He worked for many years on Alf Pittam's farm, located around what is now Heritage Farm Close, which included much of the land down to Brackmills and Landimore Park. He has fond memories of that employment.

Aged 40 he obtained his City and Guilds qualification in horticulture at Moulton College. He worked as an instructor in horticulture at St John's School Tiffield, training lads to equip them for work. (Building, carpentry, catering, and engineering were other trades taught).

Tony married Celia in 1964 and their son, Mark, was born on Tony's birthday in 1967. "People of a certain age" knew Tony well. He was often to be seen around the village

helping with lawnmower problems or gardening queries. He loved chatting with passers-by. He judged horticultural shows in the village and photographed our carnivals. He gave talks at the Wine Club and WI meetings. He bowled for the Whyte Melville Bowls Club in Moulton for 30 years.

On leaving Tiffield he took on regular work in several larger gardens, notably Joan Martin's, Jenny Butterfield's, and Maurice Orton's for about 20 years. On Cleatham House open garden days he showed visitors around and answered their questions. His knowledge of the correct plant names was phenomenal. He was a careful, thorough gardener who knew exactly what needed doing. Work was interspersed with several cups of tea, tuna sandwiches and cake!

Recognisable in his cap he was, and still is, a great talker. He hung up his secateurs a few years ago. Tony and Celia sometimes visit The Well on Fridays with their son, Mark. They would love it if old acquaintances came and had a quick chat down memory lane.

Never was there a truer statement. On September the 18th Katie, our daughter, a true Hardingstone girl, married her fiancé at our wonderful church. The weather was fantastic and the day couldn't have gone better.
