The Parish Council will be working with the 'Hardingstone Organisations Together' (HOT) group to arrange some celebrations for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee weekend. A meeting of HOT has been arranged for Saturday February 5th, see details on page 6.

Thanks to all those who turned out on a cold November day to plant bulbs and trees in the Rec. The trees were planted as part of the 'Queen's Green Canopy', an initiative to plant trees across the country to mark her 70 years on the throne. We look forward to seeing them grow over the coming years. Hopefully the bulbs will flower in the next couple of months brightening up the Rec.

Thanks also to Sue Clements and Primrose Gobey for their work in putting up and removing the Christmas tree this year. It looked really great and brightened up The Green during December.



In December the Parish Council discussed the budget for the year 2022/23. It was agreed to reduce the precept from £45,000 to £40,000 so everyone should see a small decrease in the Parish council share of their tax bill.

We are pleased to welcome David Laughton back to the Council. The experience he gained during his previous service will be really appreciated over the coming months. He was co-opted in the January meeting, and fills one of our vacancies, but we are still short by one councillor, so if you would like to find out what this entails, please contact the Parish Clerk.

Northampton Bike Park approved

In the last issue we showed the layout of the proposed bike park to the north of the village, which was scheduled to be discussed at a meeting of the West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) Planning Committee. WNC has now granted planning permission for the bike park on the old Hardingstone 9 golf course.

The application generated significant interest with consultation responses from specialist authorities, local interest groups, and the public. Hardingstone Parish Council did not object to the proposal but asked for safety, parking and antisocial behaviour concerns to be addressed.

There were over 120 responses from the general public. Positive comments praised a great facility for local mountain bikers which could produce world-class

athletes, whilst others welcomed healthy recreation for wider public

usage. Some said it was already being used by mountain bikers, and making it an official facility would provide protection for nature and safety. Others felt it may encourage more people to try cycling, which could lead to greener travel methods.

The most common concerns were anti-social behaviour, traffic and parking problems; and the protection of wildlife and archaeological remains. Nature has moved in during the years since abandonment as a golf course, and the site's proximity to the 1460 Battle of Northampton battlefield made it a potential route for fleeing Lancastrian soldiers. Continuing safe access for walkers was also a concern.

Planning permission was granted subject to various conditions, which include:

Archaeological works

- Ecological management, during construction and for the next 30 years
- Pedestrian paths within the site
- Kissing gates, signage and safe crossing points for the public footpaths
- Car and bike parking at Delapre golf centre

Danger from fallen leaves.

On 2nd Dec NHW reported to West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) that leaf clearance was necessary from Blue Barns down to Back Lane, as all the leaves of the church trees were down and that the area becomes highly slippery. It is well used by elderly people, and has no footway on the opposite of the road, so pedetrians were having to walk in the road. Several people complained to me about the area. I was told that the target date was 10th Dec. On 18th of Dec I complained of no work being done. I informed ClIr Phil Larratt, who mailed Veolia, WNC's agent.

In January I received several emails from departments of WNC/agencies and was told clearance is done area by area, a policy decision, not on individual requests, and was given a revised date of 7th January.



This same problem happens every

year; there was a delayed response last time also, with the result that people slip, and much of the debris is washed into the gullies and drains, some of which become blocked. As at 18th January this has still not been done.

Residents need to report matters like this to West Northants Council directly, so that concerns are highlighted multiple times and may get more attention. I hope that Hardingstone Parish Council will also raise this matter in future.

Police are holding a drop-in at The Well on Friday 11th March 10:30 to 11:30am, so come and speak to them, and get advice.

FoH have donated £50 to Hardingstone Village Hall Association's Defibrillator appeal.



Delapre Abbey and Hardingstone

For over 850 years Hardingstone has had close ties with the occupants of Delapre Abbey. Historian Bill Lockerbie has been exploring the history of the Abbey and its links to our village, and will be sharing his findings in a series of articles over the coming months.

Part 1 Nuns-1145 to 1538

The first recorded occupation of the Delapre site is the establishing of a convent (nunnery) in 1145 by the Earl of Northampton, Simon de Senlis the second. It was dedicated to Saint Mary the Virgin and due to its location in the meadow fields north of Hardingstone, it would henceforth be known as the Abbey of St Mary de la pré (of the meadow). It would be home, for the next 400 years, to the Cluniac religious order of Nuns.

The Cluniac order was an offshoot of the order of St Benedict (Benedictines), founded in 910 in Cluny, France. At its height the Cluniac movement was one of the largest religious forces in Europe.

Although there were over 30 Cluniac Monasteries across Scotland, England and Wales, Delapré was one of only two Cluniac nunneries, the other being founded in Arthington, Yorkshire. Delapre was a small community of about 25 nuns in residence at the outset; but by the time of the dissolution in 1538 this number had dwindled to just twelve.

Discipline in the Abbey was not always as strict as their order dictated. It is recorded that in 1300 three Nuns, Ermentrude, Isabella and Matilda were publicly excommunicated "with bells and candles" for "throwing their modesty to the winds" and "abandoned themselves to the hateful lusts of the flesh and of their own accord, given up their innocence". Several years later Nun Agnes apparently appeared in the choir dressed in a velvet gown instead of her habit and was also excommunicated. In 1393 an apostate Nun (also Agnes) was arrested and held in Northampton Castle for associating with Lollards (Lollards had profound disagreements with the Catholic Church and were critical of the Pope and the hierarchical structure of Church authority). The Abbess of 1435 received a performance black mark from the Bishop for "failing to *keep up the admin paperwork"!* It was also found that several Nuns had not "properly professed"!

The Nuns maintained a close relationship with Hardingstone Church, processing annually on the feast day of St. Edmund to give alms to the poor of the parish. As was the case with medieval convents, the Abbey served as an infirmary to provide aid to the sick and infirm.

In 1538 the Abbey of St Mary de la pré was surrendered to the crown by the last remaining abbess, Clemencia Stock, whose brother was the vicar of Hardingstone church.

Church news

Rev Julie has certainly been thrust in at the deep end. When she joined us in November, another part-time priest should also have started to help her look after Piddington and Quinton churches, so that Julie could focus on Hardingstone and Far Cotton. However, as the appointee had to withdraw due to family illness, Julie has been coping with double the number of churches at the busiest time of year!

The workload has continued into this new year as a replacement is sought, and therefore it hasn't been possible for Julie to get around to meet people as much as she had hoped to do, nor to organise a regular rota of services.

For February and March, there will be services every week at 10 o'clock except on the first Sunday when it will be at 8.30 am. Julie will alternate with Rev Sylvia, who is an assistant priest at St Mary's, Far Cotton, and has occasionally been taking services for us at St Edmund's since last August. When you do come into church this winter, you shouldn't be quite as cold as in previous years. Thanks to a grant from the Local Resilience Forum, we can afford to have the heaters on when the church is being used. This was in recognition of the importance of the building to the local community, and is especially appreciated by visitors to The Well.

Improvements to the Church Building

When the heaters are on, however, we cannot boil more than 2 kettles at a time because the electricity supply is

easily overloaded! Also, the grant came with a caveat that they are unlikely to

consider follow up bids for the heating again – they would want to see evidence of how we have fixed an inadequate system rather than propping up costs. The current method of heating the building is also potentially damaging to the fabric of this ancient building.

More efficient and effective heating is a key priority for the plans to reorder St Edmund's, together with proper accessibility and a safe floor. A very positive meeting to discuss how best to take our proposals forward was held in January with the Historic Churches Support officer.

Now that Rev Julie is here to lead us, we should soon have a visit from the Diocesan Advisory Committee to find out if they would approve our proposals sufficiently for us to start drawing up plans and costings to share with the wider community.

Fundraising

As a very small worshipping community, fundraising is essential to pay for a share of a priest and essential overheads each year. We hope that the 2 music concerts organised for this spring will appeal to Hardingstone and beyond.

The Folk evening on 26th February is a first for St Edmund's when 'Phoenix Folk' duo will be playing a variety of music from 7.30 pm. *This occasion is shared with the National Autistic Society.*

Then the popular charity choir 'Musica' from Milton Keynes will be entertaining us with music in all styles on 19th March. See posters for these events on the next page.

On Saturday 27th November, 22 singers from NGS plus their accompanist gave a concert at St Edmund's Church entitled 'The Magic of Gilbert and Sullivan'.

The weather on the evening of the concert was dire, and there were misgivings that we should have sold tickets in advance instead relying on payment at the door. In the event, there was an enthusiastic audience of 40 who thoroughly enjoyed the evening. This was reciprocated by the singers, who thrived on the positive atmosphere and received a standing ovation at the end.

Being the first concert for all concerned in over 2 years, it was indeed a magical and special performance, raising



almost £300 for the church. St Edmunds is very grateful to Cllr Nunn's grant towards community events for meeting the expenses of the evening.

In addition to raising funds, the evening gave the singers the opportunity to practise and perform pieces from G&S operettas other than 'The Gondoliers' – which they've been rehearsing (when allowed) since October 2019. After postponements in April 2020 and 2021, NGS should finally



perform 'The Gondoliers' at the Royal Theatre during the week commencing Monday 25th April and concluding with a matinee and evening performance on Saturday 30^{th.}

The next concert planned at St Edmund's is on Saturday 19th March by Musica (see poster on page 9).

generations, official documents, and maps. Gradually this accumulation of information is being added to the Society's website as a means to establishing an organised record.

The Society has enjoyed many trips over the years, to country houses, museums, and even excavations, along with research visits to the County Records Office. But the core of the Society's life is the monthly



meetings of members who enjoy an ongoing programme of high quality speakers, who give presentations on a very wide variety of topics in a friendly atmosphere.

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
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
