The Act of Remembrance

Five young people from Hardingstone Academy laid poppy crosses.

What a great turnout by the uniformed organisations and local residents to remember the fallen at Hardingstone's traditional service at the War Memorial on The Green.

In addition to the wreaths, Friends of Hardingstone named poppy crosses for organisations in the village to place in the field of remembrance. Donations for these totalled £140 which was given to The Royal British Legion. FoH also paid to have 500 'Hardingstone Community Act of Remembrance' service sheets reprinted. They are on silk paper, have larger print, and include the appropriate wording of the National Anthem. The sheets were in great demand on Sunday 13th November and are stored for future use in the Parish Room.



Poppy displays

Friends of Hardingstone have been busy again this year. More poppies have been made and were displayed on 1st November, all Saints Day, ready for All Souls Day on 2nd November. The yew trees in the churchyard looked wonderful and passers-by have been impressed. There were also displays inside St Edmunds. Thank you to all those who provided wool and made poppies. The red ones commemorate the fallen in world wars I and II. The white ones are for civilians and the purple ones for animals, mostly horses. Special thanks to Janet for recycling last year's poppy nets and for sewing on the new poppies this year. Thank you too to those who hung the displays.

Hardingstone Neighbourhood Watch

Northampton Bike Park



On 11th October I attended the village meeting concerning the Bike Park. The combined concerns of NHW and the Parish Council were read out, principally issues of safety for pedestrians accessing and using the Bike Park - especially safety on Houghton Hill, on the two ancient public rights of way and on the multi-user trail.

Other residents presented their concerns, especially the potential problems over parking in the village by Bike Park users.

Gabrielle Deere, who chaired the meeting on behalf of Northamptonshire Sport (NS), has responded to issues raised at the meeting as follows:

Parking in the village.

Any incidents of bike park users parking or accessing the park using either of the two rights of way from Back Lane or through Cherry Orchard should be reported to the Parish Council. Reports must include date, time, location

and an incident description. NS will use these reports to '"patrol" at the right times'.

Houghton Hill.

NS suggest that discussions are held with WNDC Highways to consider:

- * Closing the road to vehicles, except for access by residents
- * Segregating pedestrians and cyclists
- * Clearing vegetation around the access to the bike park and country park, and the addition of signage to tell cyclists to slow down.

Walking around the Bike Park.

New maps are being produced to mark the 'multiuser trail' as a 'Cycling and Walking route', so cyclists are aware that both pedestrians and cyclists can use it. The route shown as 'mown path' is a path for walkers, 'but under the ecology guidance NSport cannot mow it but we can lightly trim back.''However, the condition under foot of this route will not be altered as it used the existing paths/land on the site'.

Tree planting in the Recreation Ground

Thirty new trees from the Woodland Trust were planted on the Rec on Saturday, 19th November. All but 3 of them have been 'adopted' by volunteers who will monitor their health and water them if necessary. Lynn Kitchen who organised the planting said:

"Thankyou to all the people who came to plant trees in the Recreation Ground this afternoon. The sun even showed up too! A successful event. Thankyou to those people who helped out with extra tasks, it was appreciated."

The 30 trees will replace many of those lost to mowing and strimming during the last year. To help warn anyone mowing or strimming to avoid the new trees, a red tipped stake has been placed in front of them until they are big enough to easily be seen.

New meeting time

The Parish Council have decided to move the time of meetings to 7pm rather than 7.30pm each month. This started with the November meeting and will continue into 2023. Join us at our meetings on the first Tuesday of the month.

New noticeboards

We have noticed that some of the noticeboards in the village are looking tired and dated and we now have 3 new boards waiting to be installed. These will replace the boards at the top of The Warren and outside the school, and a new board is to be installed in the Rec.

Village planters

Thanks go to the team that updated the planters around the war memorial. These look great for the winter months. Thanks also go to Hardingstone Day Nursery who keep the planter at the entrance to the village by Queen Eleanor roundabout looking fresh and welcoming.

Bike Park

The Bike Park has now opened and is getting lots of visitors and seems to be creating quite a buzz. There are still concerns from residents about the pedestrian footpaths through the site and other safety issues. A Steering Group is being set up by Northamptonshire Sport, and the Parish Council has been invited to take part. We will ensure that we have a representative at all meetings to make sure that these, and other concerns, are brought to their attention.

Delapre Abbey and Hardingstone

In the last issue, part 4 of this series told the story of Edward Bouverie and his wife, Harriet, who were the first of the family to occupy the Abbey. Their first son, also named Edward (2nd), continued the association of the family with the house.

Part 5 Edward 2nd and Everard

Edward 2nd was born in 1767. In 1788 he married an heiress, Catherine Castle, and together they raised a family of 4 sons and 4 daughters. He served the local community as a Justice of the Peace, eventually becoming Deputy Lieutenant and High Sheriff of Northamptonshire.

On his father's death in 1810 he inherited the Delapré Estate and, using his wife's inheritance, he bought land at Weston Favell and the Charity lands belonging to St Leonard's and the Grammar School in Far Cotton. He also created a model farm, now called Home Farm, and invested further in the Delapré estate, artwork and horses.

Edward died in 1858 at the ripe old age of 91 and was succeeded by his son, Everard William, who was 69 years old at the time. Everard had a very creditable military career, rising to the rank of General in the Royal Horse Guards. He fought in the Peninsular wars and was with the Duke of Wellington at the Battle of Waterloo; his Waterloo medal is held at Delapré abbey. On his retirement he became Equerry to Queen Victoria, and is photographed with her at Osborne House on the Isle of Wight.

The General took a keen interest in local matters and endowed schools both here in Hardingstone (now the Village Hall) and Far Cotton. He was the principal

benefactor of major renovations to St Edmund's church in 1843 "according to modern needs", providing £1,100 of the total £1,400 cost.



This excluded the further refurbishment of the chancel, which was funded entirely at his own expense.

The original stained glass window in the chancel, now replaced, was given by the parishioners of St Edmund's in acknowledgement of the generosity of General and Lady Bouverie.

Everard enjoyed breeding horses, and raced the best of his stable, including Pyrrhus the First who won the Derby in 1846. He died in 1871 to be succeeded by his nephew, John Augustus Sheil Bouverie.

Services

Rev Julie also led the Harvest service at Hardingstone Academy on 20th November, when the tale of Squeak the harvest mouse was well received. All donations were taken to St Mary's, Far Cotton, for the food bank.

Unfortunately, Rev Margaret decided not to move to Northampton after the sudden death of her husband, so Rev Sylvia (see later) is to support Rev Julie at St Edmund's church. Even so, Rev Julie remains extremely busy, caring for 4 challenging church communities for the foreseeable future.

Bell ringers

Seven new recruits are now undertaking training at All Saints church in town on Saturday mornings. The training period to become competent is approx. 4 months, but hopefully we should be proficient to 'Ring for the King' on coronation day next year. It's not too late if you wish to join us!

Churchyard wildlife project

Work continues towards the Wildlife Trust Churchyard Conservation Silver Award by improving the variety of habitats and plants, whilst enjoying this beautiful, peaceful space.

All are welcome to join us on first Thursday mornings in the month from 10 am, and also first Sunday afternoons from 2.15 pm.

Church heating

Hardingstone Church is an ancient 2* listed building, and thus there are limits as to what can be done to make it warmer – insulation and double glazing are not permitted! The Parochial Church Council have been researching more efficient heating as part of the reordering project for several years, and commissioned an Energy Audit specific to our building during the summer.

We will soon be implementing two of the recommendations: better controls for the overhead heaters to provide more flexibility, and energy efficient bulbs for the churchyard floodlights. The other suggestions of installing an air source heat pump and solar PV panels are longer term projects; underfloor heating wasn't recommended for St Edmund's.

<u> Assistant Priest</u>

Rev Sylvia Coles is being licensed to the Living Brook Benefice, with special responsibility for Hardingstone, at St Edmund's on Saturday 10th December at 3.30pm by Bishop John. This licensing service will formally recognise what Sylvia has been doing since the vacancy last year.

Everyone is welcome to come and support Sylvia, who has been based at St Mary's Far Cotton for some time, and has been a big help to Rev Julie for the past year.



Hardingstone Platinum Jubilee MurALL 2022

To quote from Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth's Jubilee message to us all: 'I hope that the Jubilee will provide an opportunity to reflect on all that has been achieved during the last 70 years as we look to the future with confidence and enthusiasm.'

Back in June at the Jubilee celebrations, when everyone was asked 'how would you like a mural to look?' the most popular responses were: bright & colourful, large, and meaningful.

And to the question 'what pictures would you like to see?' the replies were: pictures that make us smile, that we can look at and reflect, pictures of events, pictures that bring us joy and pictures that bring us happy memories.

Surely we can all agree that these design briefs have been met and that the mural project has fulfilled the hope expressed by our departed monarch.

The completion ceremony on 25th September was attended by Councillor Stephen Hibbert (Deputy Mayor of Northampton), Perry Thomas (chairman of Hardingstone Parish Council), the Hardingstone Scouts band, and many contributors, residents and visitors.

Thanks were expressed to the property owners who allowed the painting of their garden walls, to Nicki Blanchard (the muralist), to the sponsors whose funding made this possible:

... and to so many people who contributed to the creation of the collaborative mural. The tally of different names who participated in the painting sessions was 189!



The project attracted local publicity from the Chronicle & Echo, BBC Northampton & ITV Anglia, especially after the Queen's death and the added significance of the artwork. More importantly, the MurALL has provided opportunities to be creative, be outdoors and talk to different people, whilst improving our public space. It has been a positive activity

to do during very difficult times, particularly for people who couldn't go away on holiday, who live alone and for some families from overseas currently living amongst us.



Thank you to every participant in the MurALL process who contributed their ideas, their time, their money and their support to such a positive transformation to the playground area of our Rec. We hope that the mural will stimulate happy memories and generate talking points amongst everyone who uses the Rec for many years to come.

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



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
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
