
Please do support village groups and events.

So home or away, check out the websites and get walking!



Northampton Bike Park - an asset for nature

Northampton Bike Park is giving nature a helping hand, but more support is needed

Since opening in September, Northampton Bike Park has become a popular place for friends, families and groups to enjoy the mountain bike trails. With much of the focus on cycling, it may not be recognised that the Park is an asset for nature too.

The Park has been designed with both biodiversity and mountain biking in mind, and is an example of how nature can flourish close to built-up areas. Local charity, Northamptonshire Sport, runs the Park and is collaborating with a team of volunteers to support the ecological aspects of the site. The five key areas the team will work on are hedgerows, tree management, grassland, ponds and scrubland, with a focus on the provision of support for diverse and sustainable populations of herpetofauna, invertebrates, birds and small mammals.

Hedgerows

Existing hedgerows lack diverse flora and are often dominated by brambles. We plan to increase the diversity

of woody plant species, so the hedgerows will receive occasional cutting to promote growth, reduce competition and increase floral diversity.

Ponds

There are two ponds within the park. We aim to create and support open water in the ponds, which will aid emergent insects such as dragonflies, improve the bankside diversity, and support diverse and sustainable populations of amphibians and invertebrates. Mature trees within the Lower Pond will be coppiced, with trimmings stacked to create shelter and hibernation areas for pond life. Brambles encroaching into the pond will be cut and removed. This will aid the



natural regeneration of aquatic plants and improve the pond's ability to retain water.

Nine hibernation shelters have already been placed in the park for Great Crested Newts and other reptiles, and more are planned.

Grassland

While the park will not be managed like a recreation area, occasional cutting will be carried out to improve diversity and prevent encroachment by scrubland.



Scrubland

There is dense scrub throughout the Bike Park, and in many areas it forms a complete canopy, denying light to the areas beneath. We will periodically strim, clear and coppice to keep these areas free of dense vegetation, and will plant woody features to create small rides and glades. This will create both a food source and shelter for birds and small mammals.

Delapre Abbey and Hardingstone

Our series about the occupants of Delapré Abbey has now reached the final chapter, and tells of the last in the line of the Bouverie family to live in the house.

Part 6 The Bouveries of Delapré Abbey -The Last Squires

General Bouverie and his wife had 4 daughters, so when

he died in 1871 without an immediate heir, he was to be succeeded by his nephew, John Augustus Sheil Bouverie (JASB). The General had not recognised JASB as being legitimate and so the matter went to court. The Judge found in favour of JASB as his father Francis, the General's younger brother, acknowledged him as his son.



JASB was succeeded first by his son of the same name and then finally, in the Spring of 1914, by Mary Helen Bouverie his youngest daughter. She arrived at Delapré after living with her mother, brother and sisters at Hardingstone House, The Green, for 18 years. During her time at the Abbey she was considered the best of "squires" and a most benevolent lady to the village and St. Edmund's Church. Mary was awarded the OBE in 1937 for her services, both as a JP and to Northampton General Hospital. Mary Bouverie passed away in January 1943 at her beloved Delapré Abbey. She was cremated, and interred four days later in the family vault in the

churchyard.

The heir to Delapré Abbey was Mary's nephew Major Uthwatt Bouverie and it was he who then sold the Abbey and 586 acres of estate to Northampton Corporation, thus ending the Bouverie family association with Delapré after 182 years.

The influence of the Bouverie family on the village and Church

can be appreciated by the number of family memorial plaques displayed within the Chancel. They are a poignant reminder of a bygone age and the history of Hardingstone and the Church of St Edmund.


